Children's Hospital of Los Angeles' Oncology Fellowship for Medical Students

The Children's Hospital of Los Angeles--University of Southern California School of Medicine will offer summer fellowships in oncology for medical students or pre-doctoral fellows during the period May 15 to September 15, 1985.

This program, in its 13th year, attempts to provide an oncology-related research project for each student, as well as orientation in clinical oncology. Fellowships may be eight, ten or twelve (or more) weeks in length. Partial support is available for students in the program from an NCI Grant, at the rate of \$100/week (maximum \$1,000).

The Cancer Education Program has evolved from a relatively structured summer project to one in which the primary emphasis is upon the completion of an individual research proposal by the trainee. See Opportunities Book for details.

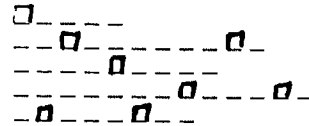
The North Carolina Student Loan Program for Health, Science, and Mathematics
