FINANCIAL AID

AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION / EDUCATION AND RESEARCH FOUNDATION LOANS

Our school has been notified that effective April 18, 1980, the AMF/ERF loan program for medical students, interns, and residents has been temporarily suspended. The suspension is a result of the Federal Reserve's directive that banks hold a 15% reserve against consumer credit.

SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES RESEARCH PROGRAM

The March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation invites research proposals dedicated to investigation of medical, psychological, social, and familial factors affecting the psychosocial development of infants and children with birth defects for the first eight years of life. The March of Dimes defines a birth defect as an abnormality of structure, function, or metabolism whether genetically determined or a result of environmental influence during embryonic or fetal life. Low birth weight is included within this definition. A birth defect may cause disease from the time of conception through birth or later in life.

The March of Dimes interests include the following areas of inquiry:
1. Identification of the social factors in early life affecting the child's cognitive functioning (e.g., information processing, symbolic thinking and reasoning); acquisition and development of language, and communication competence; 2. Evaluation and/or development of methods

to assess psychophysiological, linguistic, cognitive, social and emotional functioning of the child as an individual and/or as a family member; 3. Assessment of the impact of the child on the family organization and functioning with particular attention as to how families cope with such an event. Studies dealing with particulars of parenting (e.g., studies of reciprocal mother-child interaction) are also appropriate; 4. Investigation of strategies children employ to cope with the stresses and strains consequent to their birth defect.

Initial terms of grants may not exceed two years. Applicants should prepare an abstract in 300 words indicating objectives, hypotheses, and methodologies, to be mailed before May 1, 1980 to the Vice President for Research,

After receipt of the abstract, applicants will be advised on how to proceed further.

PUZZLE

Last week's puzzle: at the present rate of increase, the world's population will reach a density of 1 person per square yard in the year A.D. 2543, i.e., in considerably less than six hundred years from now. Two facts emerge direcly from the data: firstly, in 1950 population density was 47 per square mile; secondly, world population is doubling every 37 years. Thus by 1987 density will have doubled to 94 per square mile, by 2024 to 188 per square mile, and so on. Sixteen such doublings brings us to 3,080,192 per square mile in A.D.2542. The number of square yards in a square mile is (as stated in the problem) 3,097,600 — a number which will clearly be reached by the density figure in the following year, since it represents a further increase of not much more than one-half of one per cent on the 3,080,192 per square mile attained in 2542.
