Ovid: The New Version

In October, the Medical Center Library changed the way users access the Ovid databases. We no longer mount the databases on our local equipment, but access is now provided through a direct connection to the Ovid Technologies system. Although the interface looks slightly different, the same search functions are available. In addition, there are some new features to provide more flexibility in searching and more linkages to the Library's electronic journal collection. Outlined below are some of the changes and capabilities of the newer version.

<u>Links to more full text documents</u> (through Ovid or the publisher)

Links to the Library's online catalog (DRA)

OpenLink Full Text (HTML) - opens a new browser window and links you to the specific article in HTML format *OpenLink Full Text (PDF)* - opens a new browser window and links you to the specific article in PDF (Portable Document Format)

Journal Website - opens a new browser window and links you to the journal or publisher Website Library Holdings - opens the Duke University Library catalog and displays information for the particular title, including electronic access and holdings for the print subscription. Please note: you will need to remember the specific citation information before checking Library Holdings. The Ovid Header will show a running 15-minute timer and a link directly back to the search results.

Full "Tree" display for MEDLINE subject headings

Ovid now first displays the *full* tree structure for the first tree in which your selected term (highlighted in yellow) occurs. The "+" sign indicates that there are more specific terms under the broad term. The "-" sign allows you to collapse the term to shorten the tree. Since many terms can appear in several different tree categories, you will need to click on the *Contexts* button near the top of the screen to see all of the categories.

Search multiples files at one time

You can now select up to 5 databases to search simultaneously; however, your word or phrase will only be searched in the content fields for an exact match. The "mapping" feature for MEDLINE does not function in multifile searching, and it is not possible to explode a subject heading to include the more specific terms that are indexed under it. When searching multiple files, you do have the capability to eliminate duplicate citations ("de-dupe"). Multifile searching can be useful in determining which database might be most productive for a topic that doesn't fit well into any specific database.

To provide a space for multimedia and online course development, Tiffany is also coordinating the Library's creation of a multimedia workspace, to be called the *Medical Center Library Multimedia Studio*. This space, located in room 411, will be available for use starting in January, 2001. Graphics programs, such as Photoshop; authoring software, such as Director; and Web development tools, such as DreamWeaver, will be available for use by appointment. Tiffany has already begun working with faculty to enhance their courses using CourseInfo by Blackboard, Inc. She is also available for consultation on any instructional technology issues, such as incorporating multimedia into presentations, building course Websites, and authoring online tutorials. Delete Search Sets

The ability to delete all search sets or selected individual sets is now available.

Customize Display

This feature allows you to determine specific fields, format, number of citations shown per page, and the highlighting color of search terms within the record.

Go To

Use this function to jump to a specific citation number in the display of search results.

Full Text Printing

The Full Text Manager is no longer available. To print full text articles from the Ovid collection, there is now a small *Output* box near the top of the screen, which allows you to select *Print Preview*.

Celebrating 25 Years -- Planning for the Next 25

In November, 1975, after forty years of being housed in the basement of the Davison building, the Medical Center Library moved into its modern 60,000 square foot facility in the Mudd building, formally known as the Seeley G. Mudd Communications Center and Library. To celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Mudd building and library facility, exhibits are on display in the Library's main and lower lobbies, featuring the old library facility as well as the planning of the Mudd building.

The new building and library space included several important architectural features:

- ❖ A somewhat triangular shape at the bottom, topped by larger "L" shaped floors that reflected the surrounding landscape and buildings
- Covered pedestrian ways or balconies created by the larger upper levels
- ❖ Duke stone on the towers, combined with poured architectural concrete
- ❖ A beautiful suspended spiral staircase with a skylight at its apex
- ❖ Vaulted ceiling and skylights in the serials and reference areas
- ❖ Interior designed to reflect the basic colors in an Oriental rug (though we may not appreciate all those 70's colors today!)

Although the Library is still a beautiful building after 25 years, it is showing some signs of wear. Plans have been developed to begin replacing the carpeting, worn furniture, and fixtures over the next few years. But the bigger question is -- how will or should the library space be used in the next 25 years?

The current building was planned and constructed long before the development of the Internet, full text online resources, and desktop and portable computing. The health care environment has also changed how people work and learn, creating time constraints for users. In addition to changing library services and resources, technological and societal changes have altered how patrons use information and the Library.

To help us plan for the next 25 years, we would like your input about our building and interior layout:

- ❖ What should we keep in the building?
- ❖ What needs to be replaced or improved?
- ❖ What types of study space do you want? What other types of spaces are needed?
- * What types of services or facilities would you like to see in the Library?

We have already heard from many people that the green snake chairs should be kept, the striped carpeting needs to go, and a coffee shop would be a great addition. 

The Physician's Art Wins Gold Award

"The Physician's Art" exhibition, sponsored last year by the Duke University Museum of Art and the Medical Center Library, was a great success, and now the exhibit catalogue has become a winner too. *The Physician's Art: Representations of Art and Medicine* recently won the gold award for the best of its category at the Southeast Museums Conference. The gold award is given "in recognition of high standards of excellence in museum publication design."

Suzanne Porter, Medical Center Library Curator of the History of Medicine Collections and co-author of the publication, was delighted when she received word of the award. "When the competition coordinator contacted me about the gold award, she said that everyone on the jury was just blown away by the book." The catalogue was originally

submitted for the annual Publication Design Competition as an exhibition catalogue, but it was moved to the book category because it surpassed all the standard catalogues.

The Physician's Art presents a fascinating perspective on the collaboration of physicians and artists through the centuries and shows the complex functions that medical artifacts served in their own time and culture. The book's vivid color photographs and extensive notes capture the rare and remarkable medical objects from the collections of the four North Carolina medical schools. Duke, East Carolina University, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and Wake Forest University participated in this collaboration.


Julie V. Hansen, a specialist in seventeenth-century art and science and co-author of the book, worked with Suzanne on the organization of the photographs and accompanying text. **Bill Bamberger** was the photographer for the publication and **Molly Renda** designed the cover, poster, and exhibit brochure. The **History of Medicine Collections**, in cooperation with **Anthony Benson**, Division of Educational Media Services, Duke University School of Medicine, have produced an interactive CD-ROM of **The Four Seasons**. These unique seventeenth-century copperplate engravings from the Trent Collection have been digitally reconstructed from over 200 photographs to reproduce the experience of lifting the multilayered flaps and volvelles to reveal various anatomical dissections.

A metaphor for the stages of human life, the prints illustrate not only human anatomy but are replete with allusions to alchemy, astrology, astronomy, zoology, botany, geography, physiology, uroscopy, and palmistry. Funds for the creation of this resource were donated by John P. McGovern, MD.

Better Access to Web of Science

As part of our Web of Science (WOS) licensing agreement, we have to specify the number of simultaneous users that we need and pay an annual fee for each account. If we have too many accounts, we waste money, but if we have too few, faculty, staff, and students are blocked out of the database when all the accounts are in use. In October, there were campus-wide problems in accessing WOS due to its popularity and the grant submission deadline.

As soon as the problem was discovered, the Medical Center Library and the Perkins Library system decided to increase the number of users by 50%. This should provide easier access to these important citation databases.
