STUDENT LOUNGE RETURNS

Although not completely furnished, the old sixth floor student lounge is now open. It has been completely recarpeted. The lounge may be reached by the green elevator or the stairway, and the combination is the same as that on the first floor lounge to be vacated. A bathroom is located outside the lounge area on the same floor.

FINANCIAL AID POSSIBILITIES

Now is the time to begin requesting information and application forms for non-Duke scholarships and loans for 1983-84. Deadlines for some of the sources come as early as January and February for academic year 1983-84.

During the past year the Office of Financial Aid (126 Davison Building) has added several books to its collection of student assistance information. The collection consists of information on scholarships, grants, awards with a commitment of professional practice after graduation, and loans. Some of the loans carry a lower interest rate than the Duke Medical School loans. Generally the applicant for such funds must document financial need, however, many of these sources do not view financial need as restrictively as does the school. Therefore, opportunities are often available to those who do not qualify for school funds.

The 13-Medical-School Consortium will be publishing a vast collection of information on non-institutional funding late next spring. Students will be notified of this publication as soon as it arrives.

Just a reminder - when students who have been determined eligible for school funds receive funding from a non-Duke source, an amount equal to the outside award is deducted from the loan portion of the school award. This policy, approved late last spring by the Financial Aid Committee, provides an incentive to those students receiving Duke funds to reduce the overall amount of loans.

The Office of Financial Aid assists students in every possible way with making application for funds outside the institution without regard to whether the student is financially needy as defined by the school.
