# NATIONAL MEDICAL FELLOWSHIPS / MINORITY STUDENTS

Founded in 1946, National Medical Fellowships, Inc., is the only nationwide, private organization providing financial assistance to minority students attending medical school. In 1970, after a study by the Association of American Medical Colleges identified the underrepresented groups in the American medical profession, NMF designated Americans, mainland Puerto Ricans and Mexican-Americans, as well as Black Americans, eligible for its awards.

To be candidates for the awards, men and women of the four underrepresented minority groups must have been accepted by or be attending an AAMC-accredited school of medicine. The awards are granted to students on the basis of financial need during their first and second years of medical school, although a small number of special merit awards are given for outstanding seniors. Because NMF's resources are limited, its awards constitute part of the recipients' financial aid packages, supplementing grants and loans from other sources.

Students applying for a <u>second-year</u> NMF award should request applications in January from The Scholarship Program, National Medical Fellowships, Room 1820, 250 West 57th St., New York, NY 10019. Students applying for the <u>first-year</u> award should return their completed applications as soon as they have been accepted by one medical school even if they are awaiting responses from other schools.

### PUZZLE
