QUAIL ROOST CONFERENCE OF MEDICAL EDUCATION 1975-FOLLOW UP REPORT

During last Spring's conference a group of specific motions were made by students and sent to MEPAC for approval. When passed by MEPAC, these items become official policy for the medical school. The following is a list of the motions which MEPAC has acted upon thus far.

Motions Approved

- 1) Each Curriculum Committee be charged with the responsibility to study the question raised by the student critiques at this Conference in an attempt to improve courses for next school year.
- 2) That the Director of Medical Education require a system of evaluation of each course: the methodology for this will be established in conjunction with each Curriculum Committee (Years 1-3).
