One might imagine that Mr. Duke himself chose the emblems, however, two of his four supported schools - Duke, Davidson, Furman, and Johnson C. Smith are missing from the roster. Thanks go to the Duke University Archives for providing the following list of college seals:

Union Building: Northern elevation - University of Virginia, University of North Carolina, Wofford College, Furman University, Randolph-Macon College, Wake Forest College, Davidson College, Vanderbilt University, Washington and Lee University, Emory and Henry College, University of the South, City of Durham Seal, Seal of the State of North Carolina, University of Texas.

> Western elevation - Guilford College, Columbia University, The United States Naval Academy, Cornell University, The Johns Hopkins University, University of Chicago, University of Wisconsin, University of Michigan, Leland Stanford University.

Southern elevation - Haverford College, Millsaps College.

Eastern elevation - L'Universite de Geneve, L'Universite de Louvain, University of Oxford, University of Cambridge, University of Paris, Harvard University, Yale University, Princeton University, Dartmouth College, University of Pennsylvania.

Kilgo Quadrangle: On bay window of small tower facing west are the shields of Emory University, Tulane University, Clemson College, and the College of William and Marv.
