### Doctoral Program in Health Policy and Management

### Summer Research Fellowship Program at the NIH

The National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland, conducts a Summer Research Fellow-ship Program open to students of any of the Nation's medical and dental schools.

With the guidance of a preceptor from one of the Institutes, students conduct research in a

selected area of laboratory investigation. The program offers practical experience in research procedures and lectures and seminars designed to enhance education and investigative skills. The program runs a minimum of 8 weeks, usually from mid-June to the end of August. Some flexibility in scheduling permits consideration of individual student needs. Salary is at the Federal Government level of GS-5 (approximately \$1,100/month).
