More Changes Coming to Our Entrance

Recent changes to our entrance have required that we lock the door closest to the Searle Center at 6 p.m. During a discussion with our Library Council about the confusion between the Searle Center entrance, our entrance, and access to Duke Medicine Oncology on the top floor, it was suggested that we permanently close the entrance/exit near the Searle Center lobby and use only the entrance/exit nearest to the Hospital. In the future, we plan to permanently lock and close the Library door nearest the Searle Center entrance.



CRISP Database

CRISP (Computer Retrieval of Information on Scientific Projects) is a searchable database of federally-funded biomedical research projects conducted at universities, hospitals, and other research institutions. Maintained by the Office of Extramural Research at the National Institutes of Health, it includes projects funded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, Health Resources and Services Administration, Food and Drug Administration, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, and the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Health. To access CRISP, connect to our Databases page at <http://www.mclibrary.duke.edu/databases>.

CRISP covers projects funded from 1972 to the present and is updated weekly. It is available to the public and can be used to search for scientific concepts and emerging trends and techniques, or to identify specific projects and investigators. Users can search by a number of fields, including topic, principle investigator, and institution. For example, there are 1,009 currently funded projects in the database related to dementia, nine of which are at Duke.


Finding an Article

The easiest way to find a known article is to choose the appropriate system (Medline - PubMed or Ovid for biomedical literature and EBSCOhost CINAHL for nursing or allied health literature) and follow the steps below.

Searching for the Article


PubMed Medline Single Citation Matcher

1. Open the Single Citation Matcher located on the left under “PubMed Services.”
2. Fill in as much information as you have (at least two fields) and then click the “Go” button.




Ovid Medline Find Citation Tab

1. Click on the “Find Citation” tab above the search box.
2. Fill in as much information as you have (at least two fields) and then click the “Search” button.



CINAHL (via EBSCOhost) Advanced Search Tab

1. Select the type of information you have (title, author, etc.) from the drop down menu and type that information into the search box.
2. Fill in as much information as you have (at least two fields) and then click the “Search” button.



Not Finding the Article? If you can't find the citation you are looking for, double check your typing. Next, try adding or removing various parts of the citation since not all the information may be correct (e.g., you may have an incorrect year). Contact the Library for further help.

Accessing the Article



Used in PubMed, Ovid, Web of Science, Library catalog, CINAHL, etc.

The “**GetIt@Duke**” button provides options for acquiring the article, such as links to:

- full-text options
- search the catalog of the Duke University Libraries
- request the article from a journal we don't own



Used in PubMed

The “**DUMCL Online**” button links to the electronic full text of the specific article. The “**DUMCL Stacks**” button indicates the article is held in print by the Library.

Finding a Journal

E-Journals

<http://www.mclibrary.duke.edu/find/ejournals>

- *This is the fastest way to access electronic journals.*
- Click on the **E-Journals** button at <http://www.mclibrary.duke.edu> for an up-to-date list of full-text electronic journals to which the Medical Center Library subscribes.
- Journal titles can be browsed alphabetically or by subject, or you can search for a specific title.
- Additional information such as coverage dates, embargoes, or name changes will be listed with the title.
- Links take you directly to the journal's site, where you can browse available issues.
- This list primarily includes biomedical electronic journals. Check the Catalog for complete holdings.

The Catalog contains records for print and electronic journals available at all of the Duke Libraries.

► Searching for a journal

Select “**Journal Title**” from the dropdown menu and enter as many words from the title as you know.



► Viewing information from the results list

Refine your search using the options on the left (such as “Journal, Magazine, or Serial” or “Medical Center”).

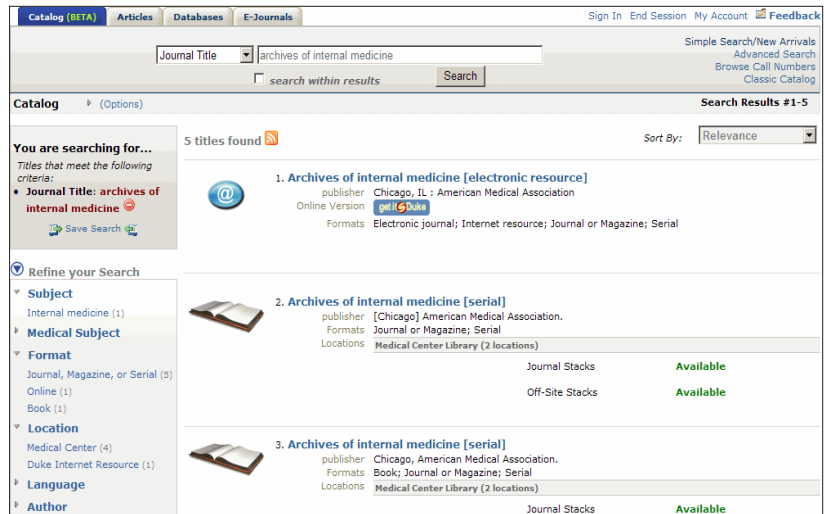
Electronic Access

The @ indicates electronic journal availability. Click on the GetIt@Duke button to see the full-text options.

Print Holdings

Click on the journal title to view the list of print holdings.

Note: You may need to scroll down to see the Medical Center Library's holdings.



Tips and Reminders

- Some materials, such as serial monographs, may not be indexed as journals in the Catalog. If you do not find the journal you are looking for, try broadening your search by removing the Journal refining option.
- If we do not have the item you are looking for, you can request it via Interlibrary Loan. Connect to <http://www.mclibrary.duke.edu/services/mcldd.html> for instructions and fee information.
- Journals are located on the **First Stack Level** of the Library. Most of the pre-1985 journals are stored in the Library's Off-Site Stacks facility on Anson Street.

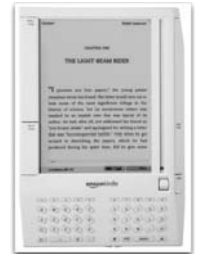

Library Gets Kindle Grant

An outreach grant from the National Network of Libraries of Medicine has been awarded to **Megan von Isenburg, Karen Grigg, Pat Thibodeau, and Brandi Tuttle** to test the effectiveness of the Kindle e-reader in the clinical setting. Students and preceptors in connectivity-poor clinics will be provided with Kindles for use in answering clinical questions and in preparing for clerkship activities. Kindles will be loaded with medical texts, practice guidelines, and a live PubMed search interface. The Medical Center Library is currently in the planning stages of the project and expects to implement it this spring.
