TRANSCULTURAL TRAINING PROGRAM FOR MEDICAL STUDENTS

For the third year, the Office of Minority/National Affairs of the American Psychiatric Association and the National Institute of Mental Health are offering a Transcultural Training Program for Medical Students. The primary goals of the two-month summer clerkship are to recruit minority psychiatrists, to enhance the skills of physicians to deliver health care services to minorities, and to increase the knowledge of cultural factors influencing diagnosis and treatment.

Medical students are eligible to apply to the program who have completed their freshman year, who have successfully completed basic course work in psychiatry, and who will be residing in the area of the five participating institutions during the summer months. The program in funded this year for 21 students.
