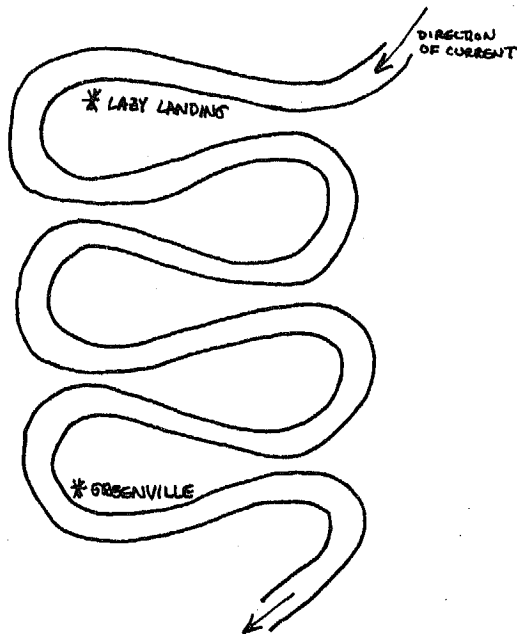
NUTRITION COURSE OFFERED
