EXIT INTERVIEWS FOR STUDENTS ON FINANCIAL AID

A number of problems have developed in recovering funds loaned to students from various Medical School funds. One problem identified is that a number of graduating students are not fully aware of their obligations in repaying loans made by the Medical

It is the policy of the School of Medicine that all students receiving financial aid administered by the Medical Center Financial Aid Office will participate in an exit interview with personnel of the University Student Loan Office. During this interview the financial obligation of the student will be reviewed.

It will be responsibility of the Medical Center Financial Aid Office to supply the Medical Center Registrar with a list of graduating students who receive financial aid and to arrange exit interviews for these students. The Medical Center Registrar may not issue any certificate, diploma or transcript for any student who does not present evidence that the exit interview has been completed.

Information on the following programs is available for review in the Med School Library in the Reserve Room in the book Electives Away From Duke.


