HEALTH EDUCATION ASSISTANCE LOAN (HEAL) PROGRAM

Federal authority to guarantee student loans under the HEAL Program expired September 30, 1985. Unless, or until, Congress approves continuation of the program, no further HEAL applications will be funded.

An alternative to the Heal program is the Professional Education Finance Plan (PEEP) offered by First Capital Corporation, a subsidiary of Sallie May (the Student Loan Marketing Association).

PEEP is designed for full or half-time North Carolina resident graduate students pursuing an advanced degree in medicine and other fields. For purposes of this program, a Durham mailing address qualifies as North Carolinian.

Loan processing time and terms on the PEEP are similar to HEAL—the main differences being an annual loan limit of \$7,500 with aggregate loan limit of \$45,000 including applicants' prvious loans. Like HEAL, the interest on Peep is $3\frac{1}{2}\%$ above 91-day Treasury Bills (variable quarterly). Loan application processing time is approximately six weeks. Application forms are available in the Office of Financial Aid, 126 Davison Building, phone 684-6649.

Local Membership Services: Programs and services are designed to meet the unique school related needs of AMSA members, such as book and instrument co-ops, educational film series, orientation functions, student directories, and chapter newsletters.

STUDENT FELLOWSHIP AWARDS IN NUCLEAR MEDICINE

Education and Research Foundation The Society of Nuclear Medicine is offering Student Fellowship Awards in Nuclear Medicine. The purpose of the Student Fellowship Program is to provide financial support for students to spend time in research and/or clinical activities in the Department of Nuclear Medicine. It is hoped that this experience will serve as an incentive to consider a career in nuclear medicine.

Students will work in a nuclear medicine department/division with a nuclear medicine faculty advisor for three months of full-time effort in research and/or clinical activities. A maximum stipend of \$2,000 will be provided. The number of awards made each year will be dependent upon the number of worthy applicants as well as the monies available. HHMI-NIH RESEARCH: SCHOLARS AT THE NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF HEALTH 1986-87

Information for Applicants. The Howard Hughes Medical Institute (HHMI) and the National Institute of Health (NIH) are collaborating in a program that will provide research training for medical students. HHMI-NIH Research Scholars will be selected on a competitive basis from applicants judged to have potential for contributing to biomedical science. The Scholars will spend approximately one year in laboratory research at NIH.

This joint HHMI-NIH program was initiated to locate students with an aptitude for a career in biomedical research. The goal of the program is to enhance their ability to do such research through active participation.

NIH is among the most distinguished centers for biomedical research in the world. Its principal hospital and laboratory facilities are in Bethesda, Maryland, a suburb of Washington, D.C. The program will offer opportunities for individualized instruction and

participation in the research projects of medical scientists in the forefronts of their fields. It will include lectures, classes and laboratory demonstrations. Provision will be made for housing, either in an HHMI residence on the NIH campus or in houses or apartments in the area.

Elgibility Requirements. Scholars must be United States citizens or permanent residents, and must be students in good standing in medical schools in the United States or Puerto Rico. Their participation in the program may begin upon completion of the second year of medical school and prior to receipt of the M.D. degree. The minimum period for which appointments will be made is nine months. Students who are not in a position to make such a commitment should not apply. Applications from candidates who wish to begin their period of research training at NIH between July 1 and December 31, 1986, must be received by January 15, 1986. Candidates will be notified by April 1 as to decisions concerning applications.

THE ALPHA OMEGA ALPHA STUDENT ESSAY AWARD

The purpose of this award is to stimulate medical students to address general topics in medicine and to enable Alpha Omega Adpha Honor Medical Society to recognize excellent and thoughtful student presentations in a tangible way. Essays must be written by students while they are in medical school; authors do not have to be members of AOA.

The author of the winning essay will receive a prize consisting of:

- a) An all-expense-paid trip to a national medical meeting of his or her choice in the continental United States; and
- b) A \$500 honorium.

The topic of the essay may be of any <u>nontechnical</u> aspect of medicine, including, for example, medical education; medical ethics; philosophy as related to medicine; reflections on illness, science, and the culture; and the history of medicine. The amnuscript should not exceed fifteen double-spaced typewritten pages, should include no more than 20 bibliographic references, and must represent original work. The paper must not have been offered to nor published in any other journal and must be submitted to <u>The Pharos</u>, which has the right of first refusal. Deadline is January 31, 1986. EPILEPSY GRANTS AND FELLOWSHIPS - MEDICAL STUDENT FELLOWSHIPS

Three month Fellowships in the amount of \$2,000 are awarded to medical students for work on an epilepsy study project. The project may be carried out at a U.S. institution of the student's choice where there are ongoing programs of research, training, or service in epilepsy. A preceptor must accept responsibility for supervision of the student and the project.

Application forms and guidlines are available upon request. Applications must be received by March 1, 1986 for funding during the same year (1986).

RESEARCH GRANTS IN AID FROM THE AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION

The North Carolina Affiliate of the American Heart Association is now accepting applications for 1986-87 Research Grants in Aid. This funding is for research projects

in the cardiovascular area and will be awarded for the period July 1, - June 30, 1987. Predoctoral student awards have a maximum of \$5,000. This is to encourage students to develop their potential in cardiovascular research. Deadline for submission of application is February 3, 1986.
