AMNESTY INTENATIONAL AND HEALTH CARE

The major efforts of AI are aimed at obtaining justice for specific individuals in a variety of nations worldwide who are imprisoned because of political opinions, religious beliefs, or other matters of conscience.

Of particular interest is the Health Professionals' Urgent Action Appeals Committee here at DUMC. Members receive information and write letters on behalf of prisoners of conscience who 1) have an acute medical problem which is being neglected during imprisonment;

2) have been detained with a dubious diagnosis of mental illness;

or 3) are health professionals themselves.

 $\,$ AMWA is sponsoring a service project at the Guess Rd. Minimum Security Prison. It will consist of the following:

- Seeing clinic patients Two second through fourth year students
 may sign up each week to see the prisoners without patient health
 problems. A preceptor has been arranged. Total time required is
 3-4 hours/week.
- 2) Hypertension Clinic Two first year students can sign up to help monitor the patients' blood pressures and educate them about their illnesses. (On Tuesday nights)
- 3) Group Therapy AMWA is trying to pull together preceptors and interested students. This service has never been available to prisoners.
