Dear Dr. Honet:

In reply to your letter of September 24, 1973 inquiring about our experience with Physician's Assistants I would find it difficult to summarize in a brief letter our entire experience. However I will try to answer some of your specific questions.

- The physician's assistants have essentially the same duties and responsibilities as the rest of the surgical house staff. They are unable to sign death certificates and they may not send a patient out of the hospital without permission of the physician.
- The P.A.s are paid out of the hospital budget on the same basis as the house staff. The hospital bills third party payers for their services in the same manner and in the same amounts as they would for services performed by physician house staff.
- 3) We currently have five P.A.s working at Montefiore and they represent only a minority of our total house staff. We have some problems relating to jealously on the part of the physician house staff, but these are usually worked out on a ad hoc and intrapersonal level. Some of our P.A.s have been promoted to second year resident responsibilities and there are physician first year residents who resent this.
- 4) The relationship to the nurses has been excellent. The difficulties that we had at the beginning were due to poor orientation on our part and they were short lived.
- 5) Our physician's assistants do write orders. All orders must be countersigned by a physician within 24 hours. Orders for narcotics and other controlled drugs must be stat doses only. Continuing narcotics must be ordered by a physician. All orders for blood or blood products must have the name of a physician on the requisition slip.

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- 6) The overall supervision of the physician's assistants is by Dr. Marvin L. Gliedman, chairman of the department, or by myself. The day to day supervision of the P.A.s is by the chief residents and the usual hierarchy found in any surgical service.
- 7) The physician's assistants pull night call at the same rate as our physician house staff. They are on every third night and every third weekend. On their nights and weekends they report to a chief resident.

If there is any other information with which I can supply you please feel free to call upon me.
