ADVISORY MEETING HELD

On Monday, October 24, Bob St. Peter called a group of student officers together to discuss a matter that had previously been brought up at a Davison Council Meeting which required immediate action. Those present included: Jodell Boyle, Sophia Chung, Steve Feldman, T.J. Maroon, Walter Pharr, Jennifer Ruh, Lenny Silverstein, and Jim Wiley.

The matter discussed was a letter of support to the Community and Family Medicine Department for a grant proposal to be mailed the 26th. Procedural questions were voiced, since although the by-laws allow the President to write letters on behalf of the Council, it was understood at the last meeting that this letter's contents would be voted upon by the full Council. The discussion was heated and lasted one hour before an advisory vote was taken.

It was concluded in spite of a dissenting vote by Steve Feldman to send the letter of support for the grant with only grammatical revisions. Bob St. Peter emphasized that the grant money is not related to the continuance of the Family Medicine Rotation. It was finally agreed that both the questions of the letter itself and the institution of the Family Medicine Rotation would be discussed at subsequent Davison Council Meetings.
