
medical school in medical education, information technology, facilities development, and admissions. In his free time, you will find Steve playing soccer, running, or cheering on collegiate football and basketball.



# **Residency Program Updates**

Like all other Med-Peds residency programs in the country, the Duke Med-Peds Residency Program had been previously supported through the parent residency programs. However, in 2006, the ACGME supported accreditation of an institution's combined Med-Peds residency training program as its own specialty. Thus, the Duke Med-Peds Residency Program received its own accreditation in 2006 and will have its first ACGME site visit later in 2009.

The Duke Med-Peds residents continue to be a strong presence in both departments, representing the program in both medicine and pediatric residency councils and leadership positions. Several of the MP4's are Medicine ACRs, and we will have at least 4 consecutive years of a MP resident as one of the Pediatric Chief Residents. We will also have the 3rd MP resident to be named one of the Medicine Chief Residents, serving his time in 2010-2011.

The combined clinical training remains intensive, and the MP residents are well-trained to pursue a variety of career paths. Last year, the residents graduated to pursue careers in medicine hospitalist paths at Johns Hopkins and Brigham and Women's, a hematologyoncology fellowship, a pulmonary-critical care fellowship, a Pediatric Chief Resident role and a Health Services research fellowship. From this year's graduating class, residents will enter careers in hospitalist medicine at Duke, pediatric cardiology fellowship, adolescent fellowship at Boston's Childrens, Pediatric Chief Residency, homeless medicine at the Healthcare for the Homeless Clinic in Boston, and a primary care research fellowship at UNC.

We started a new elective for Med-Peds residents this year an ambulatory experience that includes a community Med-Peds experience (Roxboro Med-Peds—with a former Duke Med-Peds resident), sports medicine, podiatry, adult congenital cardiology clinic, and their own continuity clinic experience, which has been a success. Two of our MP4s are participating in the International Health Elective: Erin VanScoyoc went to the Indian Health Service in the summer of 2008, and Eleni Boussios is currently in Australia for 3 months. We have also continued our Med-Peds Journal Clubs and the (almost) monthly combined internal medicine and pediatric noon conference series focusing on adolescent medicine topics or topics spanning all ages.

We had a great group of interns join us earlier this year. Apara Dave from Brown, Olivia Granillo Johnson from Duke, Ketan Shah from the University of Southern California, and Sima Pendharkar from the University of North Carolina. We look forward to welcoming the new interns in July 2009.
