AWARDS FOR MEDICAL STUDENTS IN NEUROLOGY

The American Academy of Neurology is holding an essay contest in Neurology for medical students. Any area of neurological science may be chosen as the subject for the essay. Essays will be considered in one of three categories: clinical neurology, experimental neurology, and historical aspects of neurology, with prizes consisting of \$150. The S. Weir Mitchell Award offers a \$500 prize and a trip to San Diego to present the paper to the American Academy of Neurology. Deadline for all awards is November 15. VACCINATIONS NOT YET AVAILABLE

The recently developed Hepatitis B vaccine will soon be offered to "high risk" Duke University Medical Center personnel free of charge this month. Medical srudents are currently dassified as "low risk" and therefor will not be eligible for the free vaccinations. The supply of vaccine is currently low, and the option of purchasing the vaccine for \$100 will not be available until "high risk" personnel are treated.

STUDENT CLERKSHIPS OFFERED

Research fellowships are available for study in a number of laboratories at Duke supported by the Duke-VA Center for Cerebrovascular Research. These fellowships supply \$1500 for three months and can be used in any of a number of laboratories at Duke for a research experience in basic neurobiology.
