MEDICAL SCHOOL EXPENSES

During the student body meeting in December with Drs. Anlyan and Busse, numerous questions were posed regarding expenses of the medical school vis-a-vis our tuition increases. In the subsequent weeks adequate answers have been sought. Realizing there are still numerous issues to be addressed, this procedure will be pursued:

- A disclosure within the next few weeks in the Intercom of the medical school's expenses and revenues.
- If necessary, after that publication, there will be another student body meeting where Drs. Anlyan and Busse, Mr. McGinty, and students will attempt to address any questions still unanswered.
- A procedure will be instituted where students will get information as to suggested tuition increases <u>before</u> the final decision has been made.

FINANCIAL AID
On Thursday, February 22, the medical school financial aid committee presented the recent changes in financial aid policy to the student body. The reason for the meeting was to increase in the student base loan from \$4,000 to \$5,000. Since many students could not attend, we (your student representatives) are writing a series of two articles for Shifting Dullness to cover the material presented at that meeting.
At the meeting Mrs. Andrews, Coordinator, Financial Aid, spoke about the student budget. The ten month budget for a freshman is as follows:


Most of the fees are fixed. Last year an extensive survey was conducted with
the student body to determine student expenses. The mean costs for food and miscellaneous items were determined. Lodging was set as the cost of 3 people in a 3 bedroom
Central Campus apartment. It was agreed that increases each year would follow the
percent increases in living expenses published in the consumer price index by the
Department of Labor. Thus lodging rose 13%, food 12% and miscellaneous 6% from last
year's budget. We on the Financial Aid Committee are trying to keep the student budget
in line with actual expenses here in Durham. in line with actual expenses here in Durham.

Dr. Thompson, Associate Dean for Allied Health, next talked on the financial package offered the student. The package for 1978-79 was as follows: the first \$4,000 of need was met by loan (\$2,00 from the federally insured student loan program (FISL) and \$2,00 from Duke Loan). This \$4,000 is called the base loan. The remainder of need was met by 1/2 Duke Loan and 1/2 Duke gift. Starting in the year 1979-80, the base loan will be increased to \$5,000. (Next year's senior class will keep the \$2,000 base

The following example will clarify how this will affect your loan and gift financial aid. A student needing \$7,000 for 1978-79 had a base loan of \$4,000 (\$2,000 FISL; \$2,000 Duke loan). The remaining \$3,000 was met as \$1,500 Duke loan and \$1,500 Duke gift.

ISSUES IN HEALTH CARE

A seminar and follow-up discussion group on the serious problem of child abuse will be held on Thursday, Jan. 20, at 7:30 pm in the Administrative Conference Room, 1st floor, red zone. Susan Quinn and Ann Cresswell, who are directly involved in the coordination of social work at Duke Medical Center, will be present to discuss the role of the hospital social worker and the Department of Social Services in assuming the ultimate responsibility for investigation of each case. The rehabilitative program for parents offered by the local Parents Anonymous groups will be openly discussed by Beth Schubert, director of Durham's Child Abuse Program, and a parent who is now intimately involved in the program.

Coffee will be served and everyone is welcome to attend.

On Jan. 27, the program will be Dr. Larry Churchill, a Medical Ethicist from UNC Med School. He will speak on the Ethical Dimensions of the Doctor-Patient Relationship, at the same time and place as above.
