SMITH, KLINE & FRENCH INTERNATIONAL FELLOWSHIPS: The Association of American Medical Colleges has recently been notified that the Medical Student International Fellowship Program which for ten years has generously been supported by Smith, Kline & French Laboratories, Inc. is being discontinued with the group selected last month for the 1970 program. WILLIAM OSLER MEDAL - STUDENT ESSAY CONTEST: The William Osler Medal of the American Association for the History of Medicine is awarded for the best unpublished essay on a medico-historical subject written by a student in one of the medical schools of the United States or Canada. All medical students are eligible, but the essay must have been written while the contestant was an undergraduate medical student in good standing. The essay should demonstrate either original research or an unusual appreciation and understanding of a medico-historical problem. Each essay must be entirely the work of one contestant and maximum length is 10,000 words. An announcement is posted on the medical student bulletin board, or additional information may be obtained by contacting the Office of the Associate Director, 295 Baker House. Essays must be submitted by March 15, 1970.

He is also the author of a recent book entitled "Marine Chemistry".
