REMINDER--AAMC/PHS FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM: The Association of American Medical Colleges and the Public Health Service announce the Health Training Fellowship Program to be conducted in Israel. The study programs are offered at the following institutions:

Each study program will accept 10 students. Therefore, a total of 30 fellowships are available. The aim of the project is to provide U.S. medical students with research training in medicine and medical care techniques unique to Israel, and thereby improve their knowledge of and familiarity with various problems in medical diagnosis and treatment, and with specific medicine in Israel. All applications must be received in the AAMC Washington Office on or before February 20, 1972. Application forms are available in the Office of the Associate Director for Undergraduate Medical Education, 295 Baker House.

SAMA-UTMB: The 1972 SAMA-UTMB National Student Research Forum will be held in Galveston, Texas, April 20, 21 and 22, 1972. In addition to the Mead Johnson Awards, this year five additional awards are being offered in conjunction with the SAMA-UTMB National Research Forum. They are as follows: The Roche Laboratories Award in Neuropsychiatry; the Gip A. Hudson Memorial Award; Houston Multiple Sclerosis Society Award; The Bay Area Heart Association Award; and the McLaughlin Awards. Also, the 1972 SAMA-Squibb Scientific Exhibit Awards and the 1972 SAMA-Eaton Art Salon Awards will be held in conjunction with the 1972 SAMA-UTMB National Student Research Forum. The Forum is open to medical students, graduate students associated with medical schools, interns and residents. It is designated to include papers on research in the areas of the basic sciences and clinical sciences. The Mead Johnson Awards are a grant award of \$400.00 plus an attractive plaque. Second, third and fourth place awards and honorable mention are also given. Abstracts must be submitted by all participants in every category and the application abstract (200 words or less) must be submitted prior to February 23, 1972. The Gip A. Hudson Memorial prize is an award in the amount of \$100.00. This prize will be awarded for meritorious presentation related to the liver and its diseases. The Houston Multiple Sclerosis Society Award is \$100.00 to be awarded to the author of the best paper dealing with multiple sclerosis and other demyelinating diseases. The Bay Area Heart Association Award is for first (\$100), second (\$75), third (\$50) and honorable mention. The Awards are for the best papers in the field of cardiovascular research. The McLaughlin Awards are for first place (\$150) and second place (\$100). The awards are for the two best papers in the fields of infectious diseases and immunity. The Roche Laboratories Award in Neuropsychiatry are first award (\$150), second award (\$100), third award (\$75), and honorable mention. Separate awards are also made for interns and residents.
