The American Medical Association-Education and Research Foundation is offering scholarships in clinical nutrition to third- and fourth-year medical students who have completed the required clerkships in medicine, surgery and pediatrics. The scholarship program consists of four- to six-week clerkships in general, pediatric, and surgical nutrition offered by 22 medical schools across

the country, throughout the year. A copy of the AMA-ERF Description of Clerkship Programs for Scholarships in Clinical Nutrition is available for student perusal in the Dean's office of all US medical schools. Scholarships are only for students who do not have clinical nutrition clerkships available, or available in their special area of interest at their own schools. Students who are accepted to the program will receive a \$700 award to defray living and traveling costs.
