PSYCHIATRIC RESIDENCY TRAINING PROGRAM AT RUTGERS - Information has been received on the psychiatric residency program at Rutgers Medical School. The program is open to those who have completed internship training or, in certain cases, to those who have completed medical school or post doctoral medical experiences when the applicant's clinical training is deemed adequate. It integrates three major areas of psychiatry: 1) Social/Community Psychiatry, 2) Individual/Dynamic Psychiatry, and 3) Neurobiological Psychiatry. The three year program includes a broad training in the behavioral sciences and in numerous modalities of rational therapy. There is a strong emphasis in child psychiatry early in the program. The program includes opportunity for the selection and development of individualized programs based on the resident's background and interests. Psychoanalytic training for qualified students is available in the area. ANNOUNCEMENT OF OPENING IN HUMAN GENETICS AT ILLINOIS STATE - A position is open for a geneticist interested in teaching and research. Preference will be given to applicants who wish to pursue research in some aspect of human genetics, and who are interested in devoting some of their time to genetic counseling. Starting salary will be competitive and will depend upon qualifications and experience. Total enrollment of the University is approximately 18,000 students. The Department of Biological Sciences currently has enrolled 624 undergraduate majors and 90 full-time graduate students. The Department is well equipped for teaching and research. TRAINING PROGRAM IN SOCIAL RESEARCH AND PSYCHIATRY AT BRANDEIS UNIVERSITY - A combined Ph.D.-Psychiatric Residency Program is being offered by Brandeis University in conjunction with Worcester State Hospital and Worcester Youth Guidance Center. These three institutions have joined together to provide a small number of graduates from medical schools, and preferably approved internships, a program of academic coursework and practical training in psychiatry. Over a four-year period, students will receive the adult and child psychiatric training necessary for board eligibility, as well as undertake the necessary academic work in social science, social policy and planning, and social research to meet the Ph.D. requirements of the Florence Heller Graduate School for Advanced Studies in Social Welfare, Brandeis University. Individuals completing their final year of medical school or their internship may apply. A stipend of approximately \$13,000 will be available for each of the four years of the program.
