Financial Aid

Please pick up your financial aid application packet within the next week for financial assistance for academic year 1979-80. The Office of Financial Aid is located in Room 123, Davison Bldg., Green Zone, and is open 8:30 a.m.-5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The second article on financial aid concerns loan repayment. As out-lined in the previous article, 50-55 students per 2nd, 3rd, and 4th year are in need of financial aid. This year's freshman class has 82 students in need of financial aid with an average financial need of \$6,971/year. Unfortunately, these figures will only increase and therefore will not only place more demand on limited Duke monies, but will also require greater fiscal responsibility on all students not to incur unreasonable loans. This is aptly demonstrated by outlining a hypothetical loan repayment schedule of a current first year student who has, for simplicity, a fixed financial need of \$7,000/year for 4 years at Duke. Keep in mind that this example does not reflect increases in cost of living, tuition, loan interest or possible increases in the financial aid base loan package.

Financial need: \$7,000/year x 4 years.

Financial aid package loan breakdown (per 1979-80 guidelines=\$2,500 FISL, \$2,500 Duke University Loan with remaining need met 1/2 Duke University Loan and 1/2 Duke University gift.

- 1. FISL: \$2,500/year x 4 years. = \$10,000 total debt (no interest accrues until repayment at 9 months after graduation at which time 7% is charged.)
 Repayment \$10,000 FISL @ 7% annual interest \$116.11/month x 10 years.
- 2. Duke University School of Medicine Loan: \$3,500 (\$2,500 base + \$1,000 Duke loan to meet 1/2 remaining need) Duke Loan accrues 7% interest annually from date of loan with repayment to begin 2 years after graduation. Therefore accrued interest must be added and the loan repayment will reflect it accordingly.
 - $\$3,500 \times 1st \text{ year} + 7\% \text{ interest } \times 6 \text{ years until repayment} = \$1,470$
 - $3,500 \times 2nd \text{ year} + 7\% \text{ interest } \times 5 \text{ years until repayment} = $1,225$
 - 3,500 x 3rd year + 7% interest x 4 years until repayment = \$ 980
 - $\frac{3,500}{14,000}$ x 4th year + 7% interest x 3 years until repayment = $\frac{$735}{14,000}$ total loan (DIII.) = Total interest until repayment $\frac{$3,400}{100}$
 - \$14,000 total loan (DUL) = Total interest until repayment \Rightarrow \$4,410

 $\overline{18,410}$ total note at time of repayment 2 years after graduation. Repayment \$18,410 DUL @ 7% annual interest = \$213.76/month x 10 years beginning

2 years after graduation.

3. Duke University Gift: \$1,000/year x 4 years

Therefore: After 9 months postgraduation grace period = \$116.11/month x 10 years
After 2 years postgraduation grace period = \$213.76/month

Total monthly repayments= \$329.87/month x 9.25 years

Additional to this loan repayment schedule must be added all other loans incurred outside the financial aid package, i.e. AMA loans, Robert Wood Johnson Loans, etc.

Listed below is some additional information concerning repayment on other medical school loan sources. Multiple sources of loans result in multiple minimum monthly repayments at time of repayment, i.e. a "pyramiding" effect.

Loan	Interest	Repay (Principle)
AMA-ERF (max. \$2,500/yr.)	12.5% @ outset due annually until principle repayments begin	After postgraduate completion-interest increases to 13.5%
Robert Wood Johnson Insured (\$3,000/yr. maximum)	12.0% (as of April '79) @ outset-interest due annually postgraduate (MD) until principle repayment	After residency (\$50/mo. minimum repayment)
Health Professions Loan Tuition + \$3,500 (family contribution must be 0 to qualify)	7% interest	After postgraduate completion
HEAL (\$10,000/yr. maximum)	11.1/8% + 0.25% insurance premium - compounded 6 months.	One yr. grace period after post graduate completion.

AOA ORIGINAL STUDIES SYMPOSIUM




