More than \$6 million in contracts and grants has been awarded to institutions in 26 States and the District of Columbia by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare during the first year of a new program to train physician's assistants for primary care, it was reported today.

About 1,430 students are enrolled in the programs supported by the 37 contracts and 2 grants awarded during the period ending September 30.

The first 25 contracts were announced August 10.

The 39 awards are the first for this type of training by the Office of Special Programs which was set up recently within the Bureau of Health Manpower Education to carry out sections of the Comprehensive Health Manpower Training Act of 1971, a key element of President Nixon's health strategy. The Bureau is a component of HEW's National Institutes of Health.

The largest award, \$327,412, was received by the Dartmouth Medical School to train physician's assistants for service in rural areas of New England. One institution, the University of Colorado Medical Center, received two awards -- one to train Child Health Associates and the other for Obstetrical Associates.

The new program supports the training of physician's assistants to improve the delivery of medical services, especially in inner-city and rural areas. Graduates of these training programs will assist physicians practicing family medicine, internal medicine, obstetrics, pediatrics or emergency medicine.

The training of physician's assistants, a comparatively new occupational category, varies widely. The training period ranges from one to five years and ends with the award of a degree or certificate. Graduates are addressed by various titles, depending upon the program completed, such as physician's assistant, Medex, Child Health Associate, Clinical Associate, Medical Services Assistant, etc.

Estimates of the number of physician's assistants trained to date in the U.S. range from 200 to 400.

Legislation permitting physicians to use physician's assistants has been enacted by 24 States: Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Maryland, Montana, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Oregon, Utah, Vermont, Washington and West Virginia. In the absence of legislation, the role of physician's assistants is determined by custom and usage.
