Davison notes

The Davison Council last week approved a proposal to approach medical equipment suppliers and drug companies about sponsoring the cost of producing Shifting Dullness. While it was pointed out that we did not want Shifting Dullness to become simply an advertising vehicle, the cost of typing, printing, and distributing it each week to every medical student is well over \$750 a year. Davison Society dues have remained at the same level for the last five years while all expenses are rising, making it very difficult to meet expenses.

The Council agreed that the Space in Shifting Dullness allotted to acknowledging the contribution of a company should remain small. Although every effort will be made to obtain acknowledgements, rather than advertisements for specific products, it is impossible to know whether this approach will be feasible this early in the process of inquiry.

Jeff Davis, Barbara Basuk, John Lucas, Marshall Plotka, and at least one other person will oversee this and come back to the Council as necessary.

Budget Consideration: Voting and Discussion of Budget as proposed by Budget Committee

A. Fixed Expenses

Golden Apple (\$100) Kinney Award (\$310) Misc. investment income Shifting Dullness (\$650) Discussion: An explanation about the high telephone bill was demanded. One phone inside Duke costs \$35.90 per month for local service alone. Unfortunately there seems to be no way to get around this.

The entire Golden Apple Award allotment goes for costs of engraving plaques.

The Kinney Award allotment was increased \$30 to cover the engraving of the plaque. Davison may have to foot the entire \$500 that goes along with this award pending our decision about relations with the local Minnesota Mutual Agent. Money may come from other sources to help defray the printing costs of Shifting Dullness. The budget will be adjusted if this occurs. The 1978 Freshman Orientation allotment was increased by \$60 to cover the cost of beer and soda at the evening meeting introducing first year students to the Davison Society activities.

Raising Outside Funds - Is it appropriate for groups to sell body fluids, participate in experiments, etc. for funds? Decision - Leave it up to groups, with realization that Davison likes to initially fund new groups who ultimately intend to become self-sufficient.

SEX ED PLANS

For the newcomers to DUMC, and for anyone else as well, we thought it would be helpful to explain the plans and activities of the Sex Ed Committee for 1978-79. By way of historical background, for years the committee has undertaken two primary functions. The first fundtion has been rather service oriented - we have been teaching the rudiments of sex education to local seventh-graders during their science classes. The classes have usually been taught by male-female teaching pairs and have lasted from 5 to 10 days, with last year's classes lasting 7 days each. Last year we were able to teach at four junior high schools in the city, thanks to the help of many medical students and other interested persons. Unfortunately, however, this still left many students without any formal sex-education.

The second role of the sex-ed committee, has been in teaching a course in sex-ed to Duke Undergraduates. We have been primarily involved as leaders of small group discussions, which convened weekly, following the lecture part of the class. Both of these functions characteristically occur during the spring semester.

This year's sex-ed committee is planning on continuing with these programs, as well as adding a new facet to the program. Instead of trying to have a long series of weekly training sessions for the future seventh grader sex educators, we plan on having a sex-ed symposium, probably in early March. At this symposium we hope to spend part of the time reviewing the factual information necessary to become a competent sex-educator. Additionally, we plan some talks and discussions on techniques of teaching and relating to seventh graders in a meaningful and helpful manner. It is our aim to train school teachers and other community educators, as well as medical students and other interested medical personnel.



DAVISON SCHOLARSHIP

The Davison Club sponsors a scholarship of \$1,000 a year for a student who (1) is studying out of the country, (2) is doing a study away accredited term in primary care. In the last six years only one student has chosen to do a primary care rotation. This scholarship is available to anyone who applies who is planning to do a study away in clinical science outside of the United States. It is preferred that you do one in primary care -- in family medicine, pediatrics, medicine or obstetrics and gynecology. However, I do not want to discourage any student who may need financial aid in studying out of the country. Any student interested in applying for this scholarship should see Dr. Shirley Osterhout. The deadline for returning applications to the Office of Medical Education is January 30, 1979.

If you desire to study away in any program, either basic science or clinical science, you must contact either Mary Hicks or Jeanne Lee in the Office of Medical Education to complete appropriate applications to be

presented to the Study Away Committee. Accreditation for study away will only be given to students who have followed accepted procedures for study away programs - that is completion of study away application, review of application by appropriate departmental advisors and departmental chairman and approval by Study Away Committee. If there are any questions, please see Dr. Shirley Osterhout. Please note that upon returning from study away you must complete student evaluation of your study away experience. This is reviewed by the Study Away Committee and credit is given at that time.
