Our Most Difficult Decisions: Journal Cancellations

Our journal collection is vital to serving Duke's clinical, education, and research missions. In January 2003, we will begin our second round of reviewing journal titles for possible cancellations in January 2004 and January 2005. We need *your help* to ensure that we are reallocating our limited journal budget to the most important titles.

The journal cuts will be deeper than originally planned due to the steep price increases we are experiencing for both paper and electronic-only subscriptions. When funding becomes tight or decreases, the Library faces the difficult task of deciding what is most important to you. Our decisions will be even more difficult since we will be considering titles that you may view as core research and clinical titles, as well as highly specialized ones.

How are we approaching this important and difficult task?

- ① We will be asking each school, department and division for a list of the high priority research, clinical, and education programs that must continue to be supported.
- ② Each chair, chief, and administrator will be asked to appoint at least one faculty member to work directly with our Library in reviewing the lists. This is your opportunity to have input into the cancellation process. If you are interested in participating, please contact your administrator or Pat Thibodeau (thibo001@mc.duke.edu) immediately.
- (3) The Library is building a huge database of information about each title including everything from impact factors, price, index coverage, and publication frequency, to where you publish articles, and actual use numbers for electronic and paper versions. This data will be shared with our faculty reviewers and will help support our decisions.
- (4) The Library has also purchased a "Local Journal Utilization Study" database that will tell us what publications Duke authors are citing. Data is provided for over a twenty-year timespan, which will assist us in identifying those titles most used by Duke authors.

We need your assistance with these crucial decisions regarding the future collection development of resources at DUMC/DUHS. So please volunteer to review titles in your area, participate in the review process if asked, and review and give feedback on our cancellation lists as they appear. TOUGH Decisions

This column focuses on tough decisions that the Library must make while trying to maintain our budget and cope with increasing costs for print and electronic resources.

Resource: MD Consult (collection of textbooks, journals, and patient handouts)

Previous subscription: \$47,000 for 13 concurrent users

☐ Price for 2003: \$61,000 (29% increase)

Decision: The Library has decreased its number of concurrent users to 9 for a cost of \$46,000.

Resource: American Journal of Neuroradiology

☐ Current subscription: \$270 for print copy with free electronic access

Free electronic version abruptly cancelled in 2002; now \$740 for electronic access only

☐ Costs for both electronic and print versions now \$870 (more than three times the original price)

Decision: The Library will maintain the print copy only.

Project Updates

As reported in the August 2002 issue of *The Medical Center Library News*, we recently merged the Information Services and Circulation Services desks to a single desk, which is conveniently located adjacent to the front doors on the main level of the Library. To support this model of service, a new "Library Service Desk" has been designed. In addition to greatly improving the area's appearance, the new desk will integrate computer technology and improve functionality, with varying counter heights for facilitating brief and in-depth transactions.

To minimize disruption to our patrons, the Library Service Desk will be installed during the upcoming December holiday break. The construction should take approximately four weeks and be completed by mid-January.

As a finishing touch to the renovations, the area adjacent to the desk, which houses the reference and reserve collections, will be recarpeted to match the new carpet installed in other areas of the Library earlier this fall. During the desk construction, temporary service desks will be set up in alternative locations to maintain uninterrupted Circulation and Information services.

The carpet installation that took place throughout the Library this fall was completed, for the most part, in a satisfactory manner. However, it has been determined that the stairs leading from the lower level to the upper stacks will need to be recarpeted. As with the installation of the new service desk, the recarpeting of the stairs will take place during the holiday break.

Enhancements to Web of Science

Web of Science (WOS), produced by the Institute for Scientific Information (ISI), is a multidisciplinary database of bibliographic citations from approximately 8,500 journals covering the sciences, social sciences, and the arts and humanities. It is available to anyone connecting from a computer in the Duke Internet domain by going to the "Databases" drop-down menu from DUMCL Online at *http://www.mclibrary.duke.edu/*. Recently, the following new features have been added to WOS.

"Advanced" and "Combine" Search

The Advanced and Combine Search features are accessible through the **Full Search** option on the WOS main page. Intended for more experienced users, the Advanced Search page enables researchers to use field tags (e.g., AD=address, AU=author, SO=source, TI=title, TS=subject) and Boolean operators (AND, OR, NOT, SAME) to conduct searches that would not be possible using just the General Search or Cited Reference Search mode. For example, a search query for articles in the journal *Endocrinology* about "uncoupling proteins and leptin" could take the form:

(TS=(ucp* or uncoupling protein*) and TS=leptin) and SO=endocrinology

Another new feature is the **Search History** table which displays at the bottom of the search page. Each successful search query in a current session, whether conducted in the General Search, Cited Reference Search, or Advanced Search mode, is given its own search set number (Set #). Thus, the **Combine Search** feature allows users to join sets by using Boolean operators. A sample search format could be: #1 and (#2 or #3). If you perform a General Search and a Cited Reference Search, the Combine Search feature can be used to join these two queries.

Saving Your Search History

In the Advanced Search or Combine Search mode, users may click on the "Save History" icon to store search strategies on their own computers. At the prompt, a directory and filename (saved with a .wos extension) may be specified. Searchers may also delete undesirable sets from the search history before saving. Please note: the "File, Save As" option on the Web browser will not save the search history.

To retrieve the saved history, click on "Open History" in either the Advanced or Combine Search mode. To change the database limits or dates before running the query, go to the Full Search, Date & Database Limits page, select the desired database or dates for the search, then click "Open History." At the prompt, enter the path and filename of the saved history or use the "Browse" button to open the computer's File Upload dialog box. Once the filename is entered in the text box, click "Open History." When the saved history reloads on the page, click "Run" to execute the search.

Does Your Password Pass?

The Duke University Health System and Duke University Medical Center are improving electronic security by tightening the password policy for computer accounts. Under the new policy, a valid password will:

- have a minimum of 6 characters
- contain at least two letters and one non-letter
- not be re-used within a three year period
- be protected by its creator
- be changed every six months or when it is believed or known to have been compromised

The new policy allows employees to use the same password (as long as it meets the guidelines) for all work-related accounts. Employees are encouraged to begin changing their account passwords now. In mid-January, most Duke University Health System and Duke University Medical Center computer systems and applications (including email, financial programs, and patient care programs) will be set to accept only valid passwords.
