## 2ND YEAR STUDENTS

The University of Alabama offers 2 fellowships to medical students who wish to have a year in pathology. Students must have finished their second year of medical school, and obtain the approval of their school. The fellows will be paid a stipend of \$10,000 for 12 months. They will spend alternate weeks in diagnostic pathology and research. The diagnostic pathology will include both surgical and autopsy pathology as related to a tissue procurement program of the Comprehensive Cancer Center of the U. of Alabama. The research will be related to the characterization of human cancer cells. For further information, write to Thomas G. ### AEROSPACE SUMMER INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

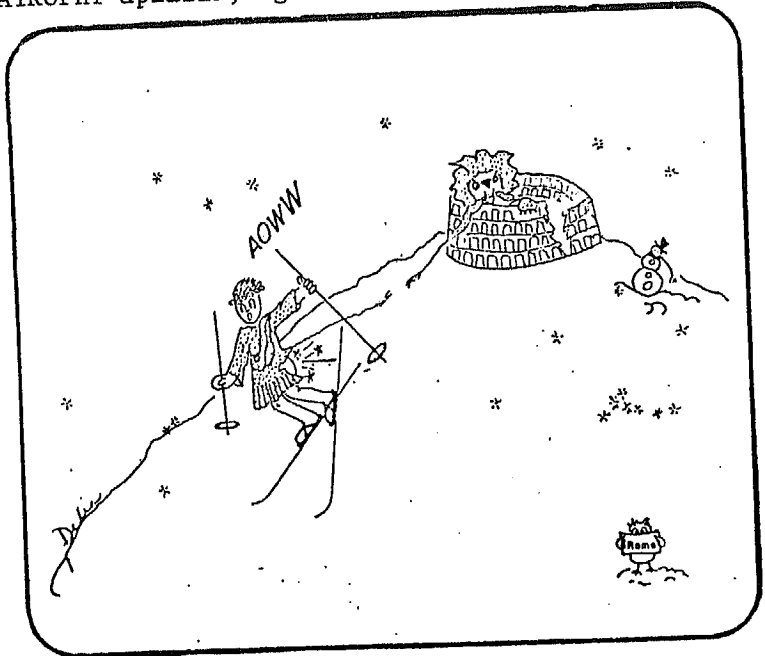
The NASA Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas, has developed an aerospace summer intern program to provide participants an opportunity to broaden their backgrounds and interest them in permanent careers in the aerospace field. The Medical Intern portion of the program is designed to indicate to students specialties other than traditional ones in medicine, and to increase the number of minorities and women entering the life sciences field. Each medical student selected to participate in the program must have completed at least one year of medical school, must be in the top third of the university he/she attends, and must be a U.S. citizen. Interns will be paid \$580 bi-weekly. Appointments will not extend beyond Sept. 28, 1978.
