A banquet is scheduled for that evening and it is anticipated that Dr. H. A. Matthews, Director of Health Affairs at Western Carolina University will be the after-dinner speaker. EPIDEMIOLOGIC RESEARCH TRAINING PROGRAM: The University of Kentucky announces its sixth annual program for Epidemiologic Research Training. The program will offer to selected medical students an opportunity to design and carry on meaningful research on a pertinent health problem in an area of their own interest. The training is for two concurrent ten week sessions: the first from May 13 to July 18, the second from June 10 to August 15. Most of the research projects will be conducted at some site in Kentucky. Trainees will be paid a stipend of \$800 for participation in this 10 week program, project mileage reimbursement and a travel allowance of 8¢ per mile from home to Lexington and return, if over 50 miles. No academic credit is granted for participation in this epidemiologic research training program. COMMUNITY HEALTH RESEARCH TRAINING PROGRAM: A summer training program in Preventive Medicine and Community Health will be conducted during the summer of 1970 at the University of Virginia School of Medicine. This program will provide an orientation to community health needs and services and will enphasize the use of epidemiology, biostatistics, and servey research methods in studying selected communith health problems. The training period is 91/2 weeks from June 17 - August 21, 1970. The student's presence is required for the entire period. The stipend is \$804.00 (based on \$12 per day) paid in three equal amounts. Travel expense one way of 80 per mile is provided to Charlottesville. Travel expenses incurred during the conduct of the project will be reimbursed each month. Housing arrangements are the responsibility of each trainee; however, information of rentals will be made available through the Department of Preventive Medicine to those accepted for the program. Sixteen traineeships are available. Candidates must be United States citizen, currently enrolled in medical school in the United States and in good standing academically at The deadline for receipt of applications is March 27, 1970. SUMMER JOB OPPORTUNITY: Graylag, camp for boys, Pittsfield, New Hampshire, is searching for a medical student who has completed at least two years of medical school to serve on the camp staff. The duties concern the routine care of the daily medical needs of the campers and staff. An M.D. is on call from his office which is three miles from the camp. The assistant makes out daily reports, does water tests, takes care of the infirmary, keeps a weekly weight record of all campers, and does a brief check-in and check-out physical for all campers. The position pay approximately \$100 per week, depending upon the status of the medical student involved, i.e. a second year student is offered less than a third year student.
