# THE FOURTH ANNUAL DUKE PHYSICIAN'S ASSISTANT CONFERENCE

The disparity between the demand for and availability of primary health care services has continued to increase in the past decade. Efforts to remedy this problem have included increasing the number of trained physicians, the utilization of computer technology and the development of new roles for physician's assistants, nurses, and other health workers so that a greater share of the physician's burden can be borne by non-physicians. The latter, though still in the experimental phase, have clearly demonstrated their potential worth.

In recent years a variety of physician's assistants have emerged, and the physician's assistant concept has been the subject of immense interest and extensive publicity. As the first institution to establish a formal program for educating and training the highest level of physician's assistant, Duke University has sponsored annual conferences covering various aspects of this effort in order to share its experiences and learn from the experiences of others. Because of the continued high level of interest, Duke University is sponsoring its fourth annual conference on physician's assistants.

The objective of this conference is to review the developments of interest to potential physician employers, program administrators and educators, and health researchers. Through question/answer sessions that will follow each paper and through workshops structured to encourage extensive audience participation, everyone present will have an opportunity to explore issues that are of specific individual importance.

The conference will be divided into four general sessions and two workshop periods. Each general session will provide those attending the conference an opportunity to hear noted speakers review current developments in specific areas related to the physician's assistant concept. Each speaker will allow sufficient time at the conclusion of his presentation to permit questions from the conference floor. (Included is a list of both topics and speakers.)

Workshops will offer views of the physician's assistant concept from differing points of view. Two of the workshops will be conducted by panels composed of program directors. Each participant will present a brief overview of the most unique elements of his program, emphasizing their importance to the emerging concepts in the field. The other two workshops will be a view through the eyes of practicing physicians, utilizing one group in primary care and a second in referral

care. Each of the three physicians engaged in primary care have utilized physician's assistants within their practice, and their presentation will examine this utilization as reflected in their various types of practice—solo, partnership, and group practice—as well as variations in function: inpatient, outpatient, and satellite setting.

The physicians engaged in referral care also have utilized the physician's assistants, and their presentation will reflect the use within their own specialities: surgery, ophthalmology, and radiology.

In each workshop, the participants will make an opening presentation and allow sufficient time for meaningful group discussion. The workshops will be repeated, thus allowing the participants to sample the differing points of view represented.

In addition, a nationally known speaker will address the conference at dinner on Thursday evening.
