AAMC-PHS FELLOWSHIPS: The Association of American Medical Colleges, Division of International Medical Education announces the 1973 AAMC-PHS International Fellowships. The following fellowships are announced for Yugoslavia for 1973: University of Belgrade from March 5 - May 11, 1973; Institute of Public Health of the Republic of Serbia from March 5 - May 11, 1973; the Andrija Stampar School of Public Health, Zagreb, from September 17 - November 24, 1973.

The fellowship grant includes round trip, jet economy air fare from the Fellow's school location in the United States to Belgrade or Zagreb, Yugoslavia. The grant will also include a weekly stipend which will be adequate to cover room, board, and minor incidental expenses.

The major objective of this program is to provide United States medical students with research training in medical care techniques in health service organization unique to Yugoslavia.
