FIGHT FOR SIGHT AWARDS - The Fight for Sight, Inc., and the National Council to Combat Elindness, Inc. announce the 1974 Fellowship Awards. A limited number of fellowships are awarded annually to selected students of medicine and the basic sciences who have demonstrated a special interest in reaearch and have given reasonable assurance to enter the field of Ophthalmology or its related sciences. The fellowships are generally awarded for a period of sixty to minety days for waod to be conducted on a full-time basis. While these awards are usually made for work during the summer months, the Fight for Sight will consider applications from students at institutions where the free period is at another time. Monthly stipends range from \$200 to \$300 for initial fellowships, and from \$250 to \$350 for renewal awards. Applications must be filed with the Fight for Sight, Inc. no later than March 1, 1974. 1974 JOB CORPS - Information is now available on the 1974 Job Corps Summer Health Fellowship Program. Qualified health science students will be assigned to one of ten Job Corps Centers located throughout the United States, to work with existing staff in a team effort to provide comprehensive health care and health education to young adults. Minority medical students are especially needed. Each Fellow will receive a stipend of \$110/week during the 10-week work program, plus transportation and conference expenses. NATIONAL MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS SOCIETY - The National Multiple Sclerosis Society sponsors a program of predoctoral fellowships for medical students who have completed one or more years of study in a recognized school of medicine. The purpose of these fellowships is to provide such students an opportunity to try their hand at research. The fellowships are not intended for students conducting research as a requirement for the Ph.D. or the combined Md.-Ph.D. degrees. Predoctoral fellowships are never awarded for less than three full months, nor for more than twelve months of full-time training in research. The award is \$400 per month. The deadline for making application is March 15, 1974, for the fellowship to begin on July 1, 1974. Applications received prior to September 15, 1974 will be considered for grants beginning on or after January 1, 1975. STUDENT RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP OF THE AMERICAN GASTROENTEROLOGICAL ASSOCIATION - Six Student Research Fellowships of \$600 each are being offered in a field of investigation related to a problem in nutrition or digestive diseases. Candidates may be medical or premedical students and must be in full time research for a minimum of 10-12 weeks under the supervision of a preceptor in the field of gastroenterology.
