

# NIH Public Access Policy: A Learning Opportunity



### The Problem

In Late 2012 NIH Public Access Policy Notice:

Starting July 1st, 2013 non-competing renewal that is NOT compliant = funding delay!

#### What happened in-between?

Policy created

New penalty for non-compliance

Few Pl's maintained compliance!

- Some articles in PMC mostly publisher submitted
- Most articles NOT in PMC author/PI didn't submit or submission stuck in NIHMS

= A confusing MESS!

- Not as familiar w/ Policy

Best for job!

Medical Center Library & Archives

- + Experience w/ NCBI databases and systems
- No experience w/ eRA Commons/NIH grants
- + Time/personnel available
- + Prior experience w/ Policy and training

## Challenges

#### For researchers & their staff:

- Learning the process and systems
- Log-in issues
- Finding final peer-reviewed manuscript files
- Remembering 2 NIHMS approvals
- Determining if an article fell under the Policy
- Understanding how My Bibliography fits in
- Having limited access to systems
- Sorting GIANT PACM report
- Dealing with bad/confusing data deceased Pls, wrong grant #s, multi-Pls, etc.
- Finding contact info for Pl's authors
- Notifying Pls/authors and getting their attention

### For library team:

- Learning the process and systems

- Tracking internal processes

### Takeaways

- \(\Delta\) Library visibility
- Library skills = good fit for the job
- Stronger relationships between researchers, staff, research offices and the library
- Library support viewed positively
- Time commitment initially very high, more manageable now
- Communication important
- Research staff often key to progress

### Solutions

- Create educational materials diagrams, websites, presentations, etc.
- Offer in-person consultations
- Offer workshops in a variety of settings
- Email Pls/authors detailed, individualized information tailored to their compliance needs
- Communicate with NIH, NCBI, and others about problems we encounter
- Broadcast via newsletters and listservs important news and information
- Develop database connecting PACM data with internal Duke data
