#### ENTERING CLASS OF 1982

The first year students are diverse as a group, and include more older students than were in last year's class. Of a class total of 114, 31 are North Carolinians; second comes New York with 14, with Florida third at 8, and New Jersey fourth at 7. There are six students each from Illinois and Virginia, five from Maryland and Ohio, four from Pennsylvania, and three each from Connecticut and Massachusetts. Utah, Tennessee, Texas, Oregon, Michigan, and Georgia each had two students. Represented by a single student are South Carolina, North Dakota, Missouri, Minnesota, Maine, Georgia, Kentucky, Alabama, Colorado, California, and Alaska. Less than half the students are from former states of the Confederacy, and the total number of states represented is 27.

Of the undergraduate schools represented, Duke was first in number with 36 (32% of the class). The Chronicle reported that 49 Duke students were accepted, not enrolled, in the first year class. The University of Michigan was second with 4, while Harvard, Princeton, and UNC-Chapel Hill had three each. There are two each from Brigham Young, Brown, Columbia, Davidson, M.I.T., N.C. State, Radcliffe, Stanford, University of Illinois, U. of North Dakota, U. of Pennsylvania, U. of Texas, U. of Virginia, and Yale. Represented by one student are Bowdoin, Bucknell, Cornell, Dartmouth, Drake, East Tennessee State, Emory, Fairfield, Florida State, Franklin and Marshall, Georgia Inst. of Tech., Gettysburg, Hamilton, Haverford, Hobart, Howard, Johns Hopkins, Loyola College, Michigan State, Miami U. (OH), Oregon State, Purdue, St. Michael's College, Texas A & M, US Military Academy, U/CA/Berkeley, U/CA/Los Angeles, U. of Chicago, U. of Florida, U. of Georgia, UNC-Charlotte, U. of Pittsburgh, Utah State, Wake Forest, Washington University, Washington & Lee, and Wellesley.

Some confusion also exists over the number of North Carolina residents admitted. Duke has an agreement with the North Carolina legislature to accept 30 students per class in return for tuition grant money. In contrast, the other private medical school in the state, Bowman Gray, agreed to accept a higher percentage (67 of a class of 108 last year). Duke consistently accepts about 27% of its class form North Carolina. This entering class was no exception. Total number of applications was 3,419, with 1,495 interviews given and 114 finally enrolled.
