## Scholarships and Financial Aid



The General Assambly approved an increase in loans for North Carolinians who intend to practice their profession in a shortage area of the state on March 16, 1979. 
# Renewal of Systems\*

## From the Dean's Office

Brantwood Camp, located in Southern New Hampshire, is a ten-week overnight camp for underprivileged boys in the New England area. It is owned and supported by Saint Mark's School in Southborough, Massachusetts, serving groups of 70 boys which change every two weeks for eight weeks in July and August. The camp is looking for a second year medical student or above to act as the camp doctor for the coming season. Medically, the camp is served by a town physician, but the camp doctor tends to minor outdoor injuries plus basic examination of campers. The salary is \$1,000 plus all room and board. #### Externships, etc.

There are ten individually tailored internships or preceptorships (average value \$1,000) for 2 -- 6 week period in medical and related institutions and/or organizations with emphasis on acquiring educational research and management skills and developing role model-mentor relationships that will further the goal of educational equity for women in medicine to medical students and housestaff. There are 8 to 10 small grants made for educational research and action projects with a focus on local problem-solving to achieve equity for women in medicine (value \$500 - \$1,000). Detailed information and application forms are available upon request from the American Medical Women's Association. The deadline for submission is April 25, 1979.
