PROGRAM IN HEALTH CAREERS EDUCATION AT THE UNIVERSITY OF IOWA; The University of Iowa in a cooperative venture between the College of Education and the College of Medicine, has initiated a program in Health Careers Education which is designed to prepare educators for the health field. Within the Health Careers Education courses the student gains the ability to utilize more specific educational techniques while relating them directly to the role of a medical educator. The Educational Specialist (Ed.S.) degree in Higher Education, emphasizes educational principles as well as basic and recently developed teaching techniques allowing the physician or basic scientist to become a more effective teacher. The Ed.S. degree requires a minimum of 60 semester hours, of which 28 semester hours credit is given the physician for the M.D. degree or the basic scientist for graduate studies. The full-time student can normally expect to finish the Ed.S. degree in one full year, which includes two semesters and the following summer. For further information, contact: Lewis D. SUMMER FELLOWSHIP IN SOCIAL MEDICINE - Montefiore Hospital in Bronx, New York City, is sponsoring a social medicine experience for third year medical students in conjunction with the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Health Center. Participants would identify a problem and work on a project related to health care. Work would take place at several sites, but primarily at the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Health Center in the South Bronx. A stipend of \$1000 plus room and board is being offered. ANATOMY SUMMER PROGRAMS AT BOWMAN GRAY - The Cooperative Summer Teaching Program of the Southern Society of Anatomists will be offered at the Bowman Gray School of Medicine in Winston-Salem during the summer of 1973. The courses to be offered are Gross Anatomy, Histology and Neuroanatomy. The courses are designed for medical

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and dental students who wish to begin this course work before the fall semester, for graduate students who wish to take an anatomy course in the summer and for students who are required to repeat some of their first year courses.

The course in Gross Anatomy will start June 18 and terminate on August 10, with 7 hours per day of didactic and laboratory work for five days per week. Neuroanatomy will start on June 18 and terminate on July 13 with classes from 8:00 to 12:00 five days a week. Histology will start June 18 and terminate July 13, with classes from 1:00 to 5:00 five days a week.

Tuition will be \$600 for Gross Anatomy, \$300 for Neuroanatomy, and \$300 for Histology. A \$50 deposit, which is non-refundable, should accompany each application.

A student who wishes to take these courses for credit must obtain prior agreement from the administration that it will accept a statement from the Department of Anatomy of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine that the course has been completed satisfactorily.
