#### DAVISON COUNCIL MINUTES

September 12, 1983

I. The meeting was opened at 5:30 with a welcome from Dr. Arthur Christakos and an invitation to discuss problems with him. He reported that the Lounge on the sixth floor is used mainly by first year students and that efforts to get a new area in Duke North now occupied by the School of Nursing were to no avail. He added that parking continues to be a problem both in the oversubscription of decales and in the security of walking to distant parking lots. Security on campus is available for escort services.

#### II. Old Business:

- A. The minutes from the May 25 meeting were read and approved
- B. Lyman Smith brought up the continuing discussion on an anti-nuclear statement. Bob St. Peter, President, suggested that we vote on a specific draft to be submitted in the future.

# III. New Business:

- A. Secretary, Walter Pharr, reported on the progress in publication of a new Student Directory using information supplied by the Registrar's Office.
- B. Shifting Dullness The publication schedule and attempts to procure a work-study typist were discussed by the editor. Mark Ling suggested that the editor be paid a salary in the future and Bob St. Peter indicated he would pursue the matter.
- C. Social Chairman, Bob Sherrier, has set the dates for Renewal of Systems during the year and will work on Happy Hours and an ice-skating party as well. Jennie Gibbons suggested more frequent parties such as those held at Columbia Medical School where first year students traditionally tend bar and serve drinks at low prices. This drew favorable reaction. Sophia Chung added that more work should be put into a medical school wide party in the spring in light of the mediocre turn out at Dr. Vogel's farm last year.
- D. Service Chairman, Jim Wiley, told the Council of tentative plans for a Project Share Christmas project, renewing the pediatric physicals program, a jobs information project, and the annual Activities Night. Sophia Chung noted that a dance-a-thon for charity would be a good project.
- E. Intramural Chairman, Joni Nichols, has already sent out notices of intramural sign ups to all students. She added that she will be checking the equipment locker for possible losses.
- F. Treasurer, T.J. Maroon, gave a report of our account status, saying that we are in the balck now and spent \$3,500 more than we took in last year. There is no necessity of raising dues in the near future. Applications for Davison Council Funds will be due by October 15.
- G. Bob St. Peter solicited names of those willing to serve on the four student delegation for each year's Curriculum Committee, gaining commitments from Ginny Gibbons and Stan Nelson.
- H. Other Committees also need delegates. Admissions has already been selected, Mark Kliewer, Claire Spain, and David Deaton. Nominees are needed for the Human Experimentation Committee, University Judicial Board, Lunch Speakers Program, and the Traffic Committee. Kae Enright agreed to chair the Elections Committee which will hold elections for MS I representatives and the MS IV Ciba Award next month. Lyman Smith agreed to be in charge of the Student Lounge.
