a new, free, interactive, and accessible tutorial with the hopes of a community-sourced future

The HINARI Programme was set up in 2002 by the World Health Organization (WHO) together with major publishers and it enables developing countries to gain access to one of the world's largest collections of biomedical and health literature. More than 8,000 information resources (in 30 different languages) are now available to health institutions in 105 countries, areas and territories benefiting many thousands of health workers and researchers, and in turn, contributing to improve world health.

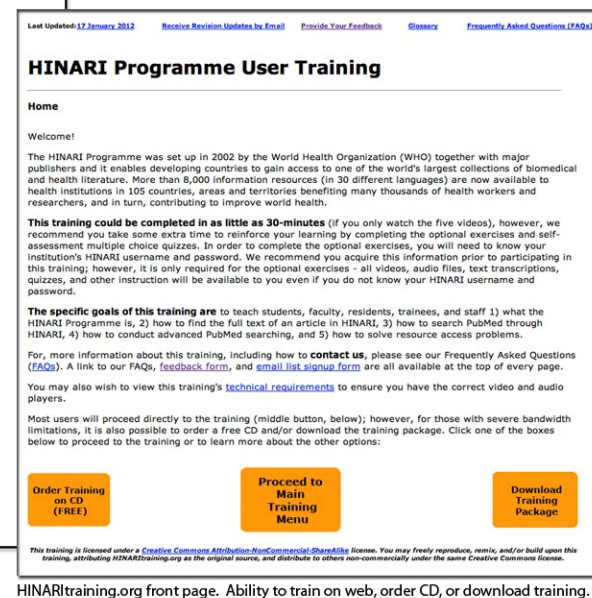

Design Phase

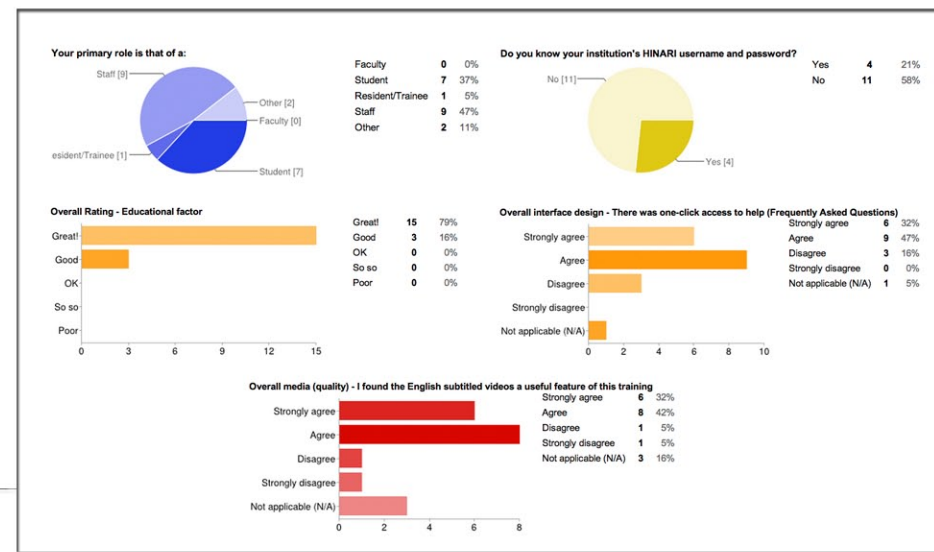
- Authored learning objectives

Development

- Record and edit videos in Camtasia

Formative Evaluation

- Sent beta version and survey to partners around world
- 19 respondents (all from Tanzania)
- Made revisions based on feedback

First Round of Revisions

- Due to interface changes in both PubMed and HINARI, videos are re-recorded and re-edited.
- Site hits total 1,195 Visits; 980 Unique Visitors; 3,791 Pageviews
- 82.01% are new visitors; visitors from 121 countries

Increasingly International

- Spanish language subtitles are added using open-source crowd-sourcing website Universal Subtitles
- Site hits total 2,142 Visits; 1721 Unique Visitors; 6,403 Pageviews
- 80.35% are new visitors; visitors from 134 countries



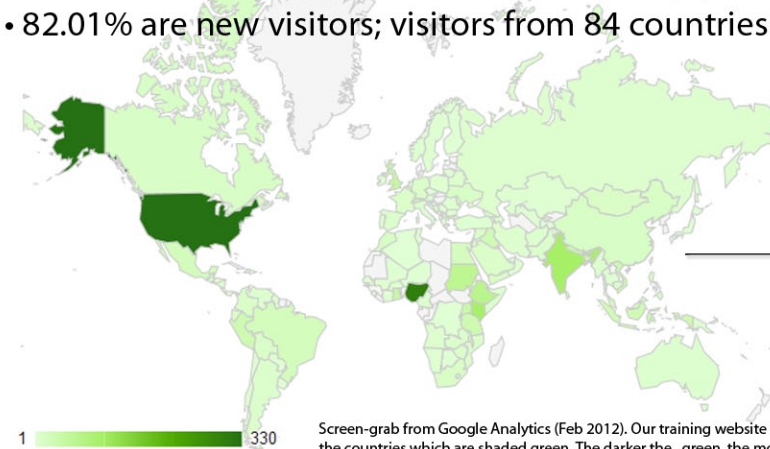

Go Live

- Site goes live
- Publicized through HINARI trainer listservs
- Added to other HINARI training materials at WHO

Operational

- Site hits total 508 Visits; 418 Unique Visitors; 1,643 Pageviews
- 82.01% are new visitors; visitors from 84 countries
