Computer Workstation Changes Coming January 5th

More and more people are using the Library's computers, which is a good thing! However, with this increase in activity has come an increase in the use of our workstations for personal reasons. As a result, noise from headphones, cell phones, and personal conversations has escalated. Patrons who are doing serious work are having difficulty finding quiet and secure computer workspaces to access educational, research, and patient care information.

In order to fully support Duke Medicine's primary missions of patient care, research, and education, we are redirecting the use of some of our computers. Effective January 5th, there will be an area for general computing and another one for those who need to do research to support their Duke activities.

What will be changing?

Computers on the Mezzanine Level and in the Electronic Classroom (Rm 104, Lower Level)

- 🖳 Will be limited to research, clinical work, and educational activities
- Will require a login using your Duke Medicine computer ID and password
 This Windows Active Directory ID and password is the one you usually use to login to your regular computer workstation or laptop. If you are not sure what this is, call the DHTS Help Desk at 684-2243 or talk to the Systems Administrator in your department.

Computers on the First Stack Level

- 🖳 No login required
- ☑ Will be limited to "quick look-up" of books and journals with a 15-minute time restriction

General computer workstations will be available on the **Entrance Level** near the Library Service Desk.

- 🖳 No login required
- Available to the general public and those without Duke Medicine computer IDs

- iPods may be checked out by Medical Center patrons only.
- The loan period is 2 weeks with 1 renewal. Call (919) 660-1100 for renewals.
- Do not connect the Library iPod to your computer. It is intended as a stand-alone device containing medical podcasts and videos.
- To re-charge an iPod, connect it directly to the wall with the enclosed cord and charger.
- Use headphones to listen to an iPod or plug it directly into computer speakers.
- Do not copy files from the iPod onto your computer or from your computer onto the iPod.
- You will be held responsible for replacement costs for iPods that are lost or damaged.
- Any personal content downloaded onto the iPod will be deleted immediately when it is returned to the Library.
