The Physician's Assistant Program at Duke University Medical Center had its inception in the fall of 1965 under the direction of Dr. Eugene A. Stead, Jr. Although the concept of physicians using assistants in not a new one, the Duke program was the first formalized educational program directed toward that end.

To date the program has graduated 42 physician's assistants, all of whom are gainfully employed in a variety of roles in the delivery of health and medical services. Currently 68 students are enrolled in the program. In the future, an expansion of this concept is anticipated both at Duke and other medical centers which are now in the process of developing similar programs.

Each prospective student for the Duke Program must submit a completed application and provide other prerequisite information including scholastic Aptitude and Math Achievement Level I test results and transcripts of all previous educational experiences. In addition, each candidate must furnish documentation of his medical background and personal references as to his character and previous performance. Although physician's assistant applicants are selected from every health-related background, the largest contingency are ex-military corpsmen.

The educational curriculum at Duke is divided into two phases. The initial nine months consists of clinically oriented didactic courses in the basic medical sciences. In addition, the physician's assistant student begins his familiarization with patient management and care concepts. The second phase consists of fifteen months devoted to clinical experience where the student learns to apply his newly acquired medical knowledge in the clinical discipline of his choice.

With respect to academic accreditation and transferability of credit, we have submitted for approval a proposal for a major in Health Sciences to be conferred at the baccalaureate level by the School of Medicine. Moreover, credits received are transferable to other institutions with physician surrogate programs at the baccalaureate level.

Graduate physician's assistants are utilized in various clinical and hospital settings. Their primary function is the collection and organization of data used in the diagnosis and management of medical problems. In line with this they take medical histories, perform physical examinations, and request and carry out numerous laboratory and technical procedures traditionally done by physicians.

To date experience has demonstrated that professional physician's assistants can aid immeasurably in resolving the critical physician shortage that faces many segments of our society. All indications are that physician's assistants will continue to meld smoothly into the medical arena as far as economics, legislation and acceptance by patients, physicians, and other health team members are concerned.
