Information and application forms for the Physician Shortage area Scholarship Program are in the Office of Financial Aid, 706 Davison Building. These scholarships are worth \$5,000/year; deadline for receipt of application is June 10.

A list of approved residency programs in Family Practice has recently been received. This list was compiled by a Committee composed of representatives from the American Academy of Family Physicians, the American Board of Family Practice and the Council on Medical Education of the A.M.A. It is available for review in the Office of Medical and Allied Health Education, 1003 Davison Bldg.

An elective for senior medical students is available at the Medical College of Wisconsin in the Family Medicine-Family Practice Program. The student would participate in patient care in the model family practice clinic and on the in-patient service of the family practice service. A room would be furnished free of charge, but students would be responsible for the remainder of their expenses. Mayo Medical School in Rochester, Minnesota, is offering basic science and clinical clerkships to students from other institutions. Clerkships are usually taken for eight to twelve weeks and are available throughout the year.
