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About \$6.2 million in contracts and grants was awarded by the

Department of Health, Education, and Welfare in Fiscal 1973 to institutions in

24 States and the District of Columbia to train physician assistants for primary
care, HEW Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger announced today.

Almost 1,900 trainees will be enrolled during Fiscal 1974 in the programs supported by the 34 contracts and 2 grants awarded by the Bureau of Health Resources Development, Health Resources Administration, HEW. Funds were awarded only to continue programs already in operation.

An estimated 700 physician assistants will have graduated by the end of Fiscal 1974 from programs supported by the Bureau. About 300 of them graduated during Fiscal 1973, the first year the Bureau supported the training of physician assistants on a large scale.

The Bureau also awarded a \$425,000 contract to the National Board of Medical Examiners in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to develop a national proficiency examination for physician assistants for primary care. The first examination, according to the Board, is scheduled to be administered December 12, 1973, at various locations throughout the country.

As of July 1, 1973, there were an estimated 800 formally trained physician assistants in the United States, about double the number a year earlier.

The Federal Government has supported the training of physician assistants for primary care in an effort to improve the delivery of medical services, especially in inner-city and rural areas. Graduates of these programs assist physicians practicing family medicine, internal medicine, obstetrics, pediatrics or emergency medicine.

The training of physician assistants, a comparatively new occupational category, varies widely. The training period ranges from one to five years.

Graduates are addressed by various titles, depending upon the program completed, such as physician assistant, Medex , Child Health Associate, Clinical Associate, Medical Services Assistant, etc.

Legislation permitting physicians to delegate medical tasks to assistants has been enacted in 33 States. They are: Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia and Wyoming. In the absence of legislation, the role of physician assistants is determined by custom and usage.
