FELLOWSHIPS

NATIONAL FELLOWSHIPS FOR GRADUATE OR PROFESSIONAL STUDY

There are several national fellowships for graduate study for which students are interviewed and recommended by faculty committees at Duke. Med Students interested in these fellowships should see the appropriate faculty committee chairman (listed below) immediately. The campus deadline for submitting applications - including essay, recommendations, transcripts, etc.--for several of the fellowships is October 1.

Fulbright-Hays Grants for study abroad. Applicants must have a "study plan or project..that can be completed in only one country and in one academic year." Proficiency in the language of the country usually required. Due Oct. 9. Contact Arlin Turner, 504 Perkins, 684-5448.

Luce Scholarship. "Fifteen potential American leaders who are not and do not plant to become Asian or international relations specialists will spend one year studying, working, and traveling in East Asia." Due Nov. 1. Contact Director of International Studies, 07 Allen, 684-5029.

Marshall Scholarships. Awards for 2 years of study at a British university. Applicants must be able to explain their reasons for choosing a particular university there. Candidates must not have "reached their 26th birthday on Oct. 1, 1977" and preference is given to unmarried applicants. Contact Aubrey Naylor, 061 Bio. Sci. 684-3890. Application due Oct. 4.

Rhodes Scholarships. Two-year grant to study for a degree at Oxford University. Must be unmarried, and not be 24 yrs. by Oct. 1, 1976, although exception to this age limit is made for veterans. Contact David E. Price, 314 Perkins, 684-3508. Application due Sept. 29.
